1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Govt. Lochan Prasad Pandey College Sarangarh was established on 8th August 1983. It is situated in Bilaspur road in Khelbhatha area of Sarangarh. Initially the name of the college was Government Degree College, Sarangarh, which was later renamed after great Litterateur Shri. Lochan Prasad Pandey, in the year 2008.

The tagline of the college is "Aa no bhadraah kratvo yantu vishwatah" that means, "Let noble thoughts come to us from every sides"(*Humare liye sabhi oor se kalankari vichaar aayein*). As the tagline gives the expressions of positive and all round growth of the students of the institution, which is similar to that of the vision of Higher Education.

The college is affiliated to Atal Bihari Vajpayee Vishwavidyalaya, Bilaspur. The college offers streams of Arts, Science and Commerce. Along with BA, BSc and BCom, The college also offers Post graduate degrees in 5programmes, i.e. MA in Sociology, MA in Economics, MCom, MA in Hindi Literature and MSc in Chemistry. A unit of National Service Scheme (NSS), National Cadet Corps (NCC), Youth Redcross Society (YRS), Red ribbon club is also there in the college.

A separate study center of Pt. Sundar Lal Sharma Open University (PSSOU) is also situated in the college campus. The college works in its own building, with large playgrounds for outdoor games. The main purpose of the college is to bring educational quality along with values to the students and shaping up their minds to become national assets.

The programmes are offered in the three streams of study i.e. Faculty of Arts, Faculty of Sciences and Faculty of Commerce for the students and there are five PG programmes subject running in the college, that are MA in Economics, MA in Hindi Literature, MA in Sociology, M Com and MSc in Chemistry. The college is affiliated to Atal Bihari Vajpayee Vishwavidyalaya (ABVV), Bilaspur, and the syllabus is prepared by the Board of Studies of the University. The planning and implementation of the curriculum is effective as the institution firmly follows the academic calendar provided by the University and Higher Education Department of Chhattisgarh. The college believes in the all round growth of the students by providing NSS, NCC, Youth Red Cross, and Red Ribbon Club facilities to the students with extracurricular activities. The college believes and works in integrating and sensitizing the students about being a good human being and putting values and morals above any other thoughts.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

There are a good number of enrolment percentages of students' admission in the college for both UG and PG programmes. The enrolment percentage has been showing positive graph in growing years. The admission of the first year students is through online process from the last few years, as the student has to apply in the university website for the college and then the university sends details of the students on the basis of merit. Depending on the no of seats in the particular program and on the basis of reservation for all the categories as per state government rules, seats are marked and merit lists are generated in the college. Most of the seats reserved for ST candidates remain unoccupied and later offered to SC and then OBC candidates. The number of full time

teachers is not substantial throughout the years but still the hard work of the qualified teachers and with prop up of the part time teachers (Adhoc Faculties) all the internal assessments and considerable steps are taken slow and fast learners.

The teaching process not only involves chalk and talk methods but also involves experimental and participative learning with use of ICT tools such as projectors and online media. The college not only believes in shaping the students for their academic growth but also puts efforts for the all round growth of the students by participation in sports and extracurricular activities. Also the problems that they go though related to academics or for sharing their other physiological issues, the students are assigned with mentors who help to cope up with their problems.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college has been working for improving its research and innovation. There are well qualified teachers in the college and out of 7 teachers, 3 have PhD degree in their respective subjects and one has MPhil. All the teachers have attended Faculty Induction Programmes (FIP)/ Orientation Programmes (OP) in scheduled time. Also refresher course (RC) in their specific subjects has been attended by the teachers. The teachers are always encouraged to attend seminars, conferences and workshops. The College has NSS, NCC, Youth Red Cross, and Red Ribbon Club for promoting them towards extension activities along with usual academic learning. Various tasks are performed by the students of NSS and NCC in the neighbouring villages. Also camps are organized by the NSS and NCC cadets on several topics. Several Health awareness programmes, Medical and Blood Donation camps, environmental awareness programmes are also organized in the college. Important days such as World AIDS Day, Women's Day, Environment Day, International Yoga Day, Science Day, and International World Youth Day, Birthdays and death anniversaries of important nationalists etc are celebrated in the college. Through such activities the students of the college get chance to socialize and have the abilities to think beyond individual interests. They learn teamwork, leadership skills, better communication skills, decision making and time managements through such programmes and extension activities.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college campus spreads over 11.5 acres of land with three buildings, the old Building, the new Building and Library Building. The college has a principal's room, two staff rooms (one in each building), office room, 19 classrooms, four laboratories, an ICT room, girl's common room, NCC room, Examination control room, store rooms, and a study centre for Pt. Sundar Lal Sharma Open University (PSSOU). The library of the college is well equipped with almost 60,000 books and also the library building has a reading hall for the students and teachers. There are 24 CCTV cameras for proper surveillance of the campus. All The buildings have Wi-Fi

facilities. There are separate toilets for both boys and girls in all the buildings. The college campus is full of greenery with huge are for conducting sports events. There are playgrounds for, badminton, cricket, volleyball, kho-kho, badminton etc and also some indoor games such as chess, carom is played in the college. The maintenance of the college is done through the public works department (PWD) of C.G. Govt.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	According to the National Education Policy 2020, model public universities named MERU (Multi- disciplinary Education and Research Universities) will be established on the lines of IITs, IIMs etc. for holistic and multidisciplinary education. The aim of these universities will be to achieve the highest global standards in quality education. These will also set the highest standards of multidisciplinary education across the country.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Under the National Policy on Education, 2020, Academy Credit Bank will be set up which will digitally compile the credits received from different recognized higher educational institutions so that the degree can be awarded by the higher educational institution on the basis of the credits obtained if the student studies as specified by HEI. He/she may also be awarded a degree in a 4-year program with a thesis in the field of its core area.
3. Skill development:	According to the National Education Policy 2020, at least 50% of the students will be provided vocational education experience through the school and higher education system for which a clear action plan will be developed with targets and time frame. This is consistent with the Sustainable Development Goals and will help India's population to get the full benefits of its resource. Higher education institutions will also be allowed to offer certificate courses of limited duration in various skills including soft skills. Subjects related to "Lok Vidya" i.e. important vocational knowledge developed in India will be made accessible to the students through integration in vocational education courses. Wherever possible, the possibility of conducting vocational courses through ODL mode will also be explored.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	According to the National Education Policy 2020, all Indian languages and their related prosperity will be documented through we based platform/portal/Wikipedia for the preservation of local art and culture. The platform will have videos, dictionaries, recordings and other material like language speaking, stories telling, poetry recitation, drama playing, folk singing and dancing etc. People from across the country will be invited to contribute to these efforts by adding relevant content to these platforms/portals/Wikipedia.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	NEP 2020 envisages a comprehensive regulator i.e. Council of Higher Education of India for higher education institutions across the country, which will have multiple verticals to full-fill different roles. The Higher Education Commission of India will function as a single body for the entire higher education sector except medical and legal education. Under NEP 2020, a target has been set to increase the Gross Enrollment Ratio in higher educational institutions to 50%, under this - (1) provisions related to school education (2) protection of linguistic diversity (3) physical education (4) curriculum and assessment related Reforms (5) Provisions have been made to improve the education system.
6. Distance education/online education:	In view of the emergence of digital technology and the emerging importance of technology for teaching- learning at all levels from school to higher education as per the National Education Policy 2020 - this policy recommends the following key aspects (1) Pilot study for online education (2) Digital infrastructure (3) Online learning platforms and tools (4) Content creation Digital repositories and dissemination (5) Bridging the digital gap (6) Virtual labs (7) Training and incentives for teachers.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The institution has been affiliated to Atal Bihari Vajpayee Vishwavidyalaya, Bilaspur, Chhattisgarh. The institution follows the academic schedule provided by the Higher Education Department of the state. The institution encourages the students to work and participate in various curriculum activities along with academics for the all round development of the students.

To implement effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process the institute follows certain processes:

- 1. Meetings: The Principal of the college commences meetings of all faculty members and non teaching staff at commencement of very academic session (year/semester) in which various decisions and implementations of various programs are discussed.
- 2. Academic calendar: In the beginning of every session, lesson plans are prepared by all the faculties for proper implementation of curriculum. College timetables, daily teaching dairies and attendance registers are prepared in every session.
- 3. Teaching Methodology:
- The college insists the staff members to follow innovative teaching methods such as internet, enotes, e-lectures, LCD projectors along with traditional chalk and talk methods.
- In addition to this, the faculties also adapt various interactive sessions including doubt removal class, seminars, peer teachings, assignments etc to help the students to learn the curriculum effectively.
- Scheduled tests for UG and PG students are conducted.
- Apart from this, various important activities like, sports, debate, singing, quiz, rangoli competitions etc are organized frequently.
- Important days, such as independence day, republic day teachers day, Gandhi Jayanti, Swami Vivekanand Jayanti, vidhikshaksharta divas, Environment day, earth day, Hindi Divas etc are celebrated to make the students enlighten with their history, society and outer world.

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

The idea of any institution is basically focusing on the overall growth of the students by adapting the student centric methods. Experimental learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are the major elements which support the idea.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

Govt. Lochan Prasad Pandey College, Sarangarh is affiliated from Atal Bihari Vajpayee University Bilaspur. Establishment year is 1983. The campus spreads over 11.5 acres of land. There are two buildings in the campus one is Old Building and one is called New Building. There is also a separate building for Library. The old building has two floors and other buildings are single floored. The old building of the campus provides accommodation of the Principal room, office room, computer room, treasury room, exam material room, NCC room, NSS room, Pt. Sundar Lal Sharma Open University (PSSOU) study room, hall, class rooms, Chemistry labs, Zoology lab, Geography lab, examination store room, store room, sports room, wash rooms in the ground floor and Botany lab, Physics lab, ICT room cum seminar hall, other classrooms, wash rooms, staff room, girls common room, examination store room, in the first floor. All laboratories are enriched with equipments and other practical materials. There is also a big lawn area in the center of the building, where the cultural activities and also annual function is conducted. The new building has six classrooms, all with green board facilities. One staff room is also available for teachersfor preparations of their teachings. One separate wash room is available for girls and boys each and there are long corridors in front of the classrooms. In college campus two tube wells are in working condition with a pump house. The library building is also situated in the college campus which comprises of twohalls for books storage. Many book shelves are available in library equipped with books. Library also has an office room and a librarian room along with one store room. The long corridor is utilized as Reading Room. The computer operator also has expertise in repairing and maintaining the computer, due to which there is no problem of any kind in computer operation.

Battery Backup System –

Keeping in mind the power supply problem, a set of battery backup system has been installed in the college, due to which there is no disruption in official work.

Power Generator-

The college also has two power generator sets, in which one power generator is used when the power supply is switched off.

CCTV camera-

The college has 24 CCTV cameras. Control mechanism is placed in the principal room for the CCTV camera.

The college has an ICT room, where seminar programs and meetings are held.

The furniture is kept organized by the students and they also helps in keeping them clean. Students are motivated for the cleanliness and hygiene of the college by the teacher's staff. For the beauty of the campus and awareness of the environment students are provided pots.

Work is done internally by the staff working in the college for the utilization and maintenance of the academic and administrative facilities. Chhattisgarh public works department does the work coloring and repairing of the college building. PWD has constructed a new building of 1 crore rupees in the year 2016-17.Janbhagidari samiti works for the development of infrastructure in the college. At present 15 lakhshasbeen approved for the construction of boundary wall in the college through District Mineral Fund.

1. Title of the practice: "One Student One Plant"

- 2. **Objectives of the practice:** The main objective of the practice to promote environmental awareness among the student and make help them understanding the needs of plants by planting one by themselves and taking care of it. It brings a noble initiative and helps the students to become responsible for their social duties as well as their duties towards Mother Nature.
- 3. **The context:** The basic curriculum of Environmental Studies only teaches the students about the theoretical knowledge. The basic and core understanding of environmental awareness is impossible if there is absence of inner love and affection for nature. But when the students are made to own one plant and made to take care of them along with providing basic knowledge and motivation about environment, the student builds a connection with the plant and most of them start loving plants and trees. It also builds their understanding about local species present and their benefits to nature.
- 4. **The practice:** For bringing the practice to reality in the month of July all the newly admitted students of all the graduate programmes are notified to bring one plant mostly personally (or if necessary a group of students) with pot and the submit them to their teacher in charge and the teacher asks the student (or students) about the plants and its basic nature and requirements and also how to take care of it and if provides basic knowledge about taking care of them. The plants are kept in the college campus and the students are asked to take care of their plant. After that in the month of February a Joint Environmental Awareness class is organized, in which some awareness about local plants is discussed and the students are motivated to take care of the plants the way they did before and then the students are allowed to take their plants back with them to their home before summer and asked to take care of them at their home.
- 5. Evidence of success: The most important evidence of success is that not all but some of the students are seen to take care of their own plants as well as other student's plants. The students also seen to start talking and asking doubts about plants with their teachers in their class. Some of the students have started planting gardens in the spaces available in their home and share their pictures with the teachers. We believe that by this practice we have build love and affection in our students for nature.

6. **Problems countered and resources required:** The most important problem that we come across is the shortage of water in the campus. The college is in a place where there is scarcity of water in summers and drinking water is given preference over providing water to the plants for keeping the campus green. In such situation we need to return the plants to students so that they remain alive during summer.
